

MOST OF 1964 FHS GRADS CONTINUING EDUCATION

According to Mr. Arthur J. Peluso, Director of Guidance at Fulton High School, the members of the graduating class of June 1964 are now engaged in a variety of activities. One hundred sixty graduates, about 62% of the class, have now embarked on some form of education beyond high school. Of these, eight are attending vocational schools; eighteen, business schools; thirty-two, community or junior colleges or two-year technical institutes; twenty-two, nurse-training programs (includes four attending two-year degree granting nursing schools); and seventy-seven, four-year degree granting institutions. Four graduates have returned to high school for post-graduate work, two are in preparatory schools and the foreign student has resumed college-preparatory work in her own country.

Three girls have married; sixteen boys are in the armed services; about twenty-five percent of the June graduates are gainfully employed—ten in offices and forty-seven in various types of work, such as clerks, gas station attendants, industry, etc.; seven have temporary jobs and thirteen are in search of employment; one student could not be contacted.

Once again, private universities and out-of-state colleges have this year attracted a majority of the graduates.
